Grouping of students in different year groups.

As previously communicated, with COVID restrictions we have had to make school grouping decisions based on bubbles and limited movement. As we head into "life without COVID", as a school, we are reverting back to a more research-informed approach.

In Year 7, students will be taught in form groups. The groupings are based on all the information we have from Primary Schools. In January, students will be regrouped for Maths only. This is to enable the groupings to be mixed attainment based solely on maths attainment, rather than other sources.

In Year 8, students will be taught in a mixed attainment class that is different from their form group in all but maths. The mixed attainment grouping is based on their performance during Year 7, our knowledge of the students and a number of different sources of information. For maths, they will be mixed attainment groupings based on maths attainment during Year 7. There will be a high attainment band to address the needs of the different experiences of lockdown and the catch-up agenda.

In Year 9, students will be taught in two different mixed attainment groupings and have a separate maths grouping based on maths attainment only. The groups are put together based on our knowledge of the students, their attainment during Year 8 and a number of other sources. For maths, they will be mixed attainment groupings based on maths attainment during Year 8. There will be a high attainment band to address the needs of the different experiences of lockdown and the catch-up agenda.

In Year 10, students were all given their option choices this year. Therefore, a majority of subjects will be

taught in mixed attainment groupings based on option choice and other information if timetabling allowed. For maths, English and core science, there will be loose banding based on KS3 attainment and other sources of information. All students will be taught the same curriculum content and have the same assessments. Any decision about Higher or Foundation Tier entry will not be made until after Mock Exams in Year 11.

PREP Survey Results and Actions

It has been 5 years since we launched PREP in our school. We have adapted and developed the concept over that time, often responding to student and parental feedback. We made some quite radical adaptions during COVID to help families and relieve some of the pressures that families were feeling. But now we are back to relative normality, the time had come to complete a full review.

This year, we surveyed all key stage 3 students, interviewed students from all year groups and surveyed parents. The consultation was to help us understand the successes and barriers that require further refinement. Many thanks to the over 200 parents who took the time to respond and to some who emailed further feedback.

Key Findings

• 55% of students complete PREP that is NOT set by the teacher. This would suggest that we currently have just over half the school population who are buying in to the

independent learning skills that PREP aims to improve.

- 30% of students do not have somewhere quiet at home to work on PREP and 60% report getting distracted when completing PREP.
- 57% of students did not understand that PREP is not always linked to the learning in class and that PREP is to help with long-term retention of previously learnt knowledge.
- Parents reported that 80% of students do not complete PREP from the PREP Newsletter and further parental emails confirmed the struggle with encouraging and motivating students at home.
- Just under 60% of parents help their child revise for classroom assessments. This is a large and improved percentage on previous surveys, perhaps suggesting that parents are more understanding about the importance of their role.
- Some of the parental emails stated things such as "I can't get them to complete PREP at home. I think the school should be handing out more detentions for not doing PREP!" or "We don't feel like the school is setting enough PREP compared to other schools. We are concerned that students are not catching up after COVID".

Actions for 2022/23

We have listened, discussed and will be making some adjustments to help with some of the continued frustrations and barriers.

1. We are going to bring some further clarity in what is expected of students for PREP. PREP will now be in three forms:

Edulink PREP – This is curriculum aligned work that has a **deadline**. The PREP common language is to be used for each piece set and how the PREP work is to be completed will be supported within lessons.

Wider PREP – This is on the PREP newsletter each half term and is there to broaden understanding, deepen knowledge and improve the hinterland. Specific tasks will be set to encourage students to become 'Exceeding Expectations' for A2L.

Super-Curricular – Supported through the PREP Newsletter and House competitions. This is a way to direct parents to additional learning opportunities such as historical sites, museums, galleries, theatre, media, tv etc that can help to cement a fuller understanding of the curriculum. 2. We are making changes to our **Attitude to Learning** score to make it very clear what our expectations are around PREP.

As you can see, if a student misses an Edulink PREP deadline, they will be moved down to 'Occasionally Below Expectations'. **They will then have to complete a task of Wider PREP** from the Newsletter to get their attitude to learning back to 'Meeting Expectations'.

You will also notice that the only way students can be 'Exceeding Expectations' in a subject, is if they have completed Wider PREP from the PREP Newsletter. This has clear implications for our student reward system, where an average of 3.2 is required for any award to be given. This means they must be exceeding in at least two subjects.

This change should help to address the 'optional' frustrations that parents have experienced. We are raising our expectations of students across the school and using PREP as a vehicle for this.

- We are bringing back the PREP Drop-in Timetable, so that students have opportunities before school, break, lunch and after school to complete PREP across all departments with a specialist teacher present to assist.
- 4. Increasing departmental support for students. Each department will have a clear policy on how they will support students to complete PREP for their subject. This may include contact home, suggested PREP drop-in sessions or parental meetings with the subject teacher and head of department.

Overview

What I hope you take away from our policy up-date is a determination to ensure students value their learning inside and outside the classroom. That expectations of their home-learning is being stepped-up. That the school are putting in more measures to support students and parents to complete PREP. That a threeway partnership between students, parents and the school is as vital as it ever has been in raising student outcomes in a tricky educational landscape.

Those students who buy-in to PREP are flourishing into the independent, driven and motivated students that will ultimately be successful in school and future careers. We want this for all students and will continue to work towards this with your support. PREP is not a chore, it's a way of life!

This should help the students to have a greater understanding of what is involved in these subjects before making their option choices.

Junior Performing Arts Academy

This term we celebrated the success and talent of our Junior Performing Arts Academy students at the JPAA 2022 Showcase and Awards evening.

Our academy members provided parents, staff and new 2022 JPAA joiners with an array of performances, showcasing the performance styles they have explored this year and repertoire they have built.

This year we have an academy of 35 students and they have worked hard in JPAA sessions to create material for various events, performances and competitions.



Back in November, our Year 8 JPAA students took part in a poetry competition held at Beauchamps High School, where two groups and two soloists performed powerful poems based on the theme 'Our Changing Globe'. Though we did not take home the trophy, our Year 8 students made us proud and delivered the poems with such meaning and conviction.

In December, we took our JPAA students up to London to watch a performance of the West End production of Matilda. Before the performance, they also took part in a West End Professionals workshop with a member of the Matilda cast and were so impressive at picking up the set choreography from the show in just 1.5 hours.

In February, our Year 9 and 10 JPAA students took part in the Shakespeare School's Festival, where they competed against three other schools in a performance of a Shakespeare play at The Palace Theatre, Southend. Their adaptation of 'A Midsummer Night's Dream' impressed the audience and panel and they were awarded first place that evening. Martin Leonard, the festival's organiser, said "Shenfield's JPAA performed with confidence, gusto and great stage presence." We cannot wait to see next year's adaptation of 'Much Ado About Nothing' which our current Year 8-10 JPAA students will perform in November.



At the end of this year we held a 'Choreography Competition', where students were invited to create and work on their own singing, drama and pieces in groups or as solo performers and present them at an audition in front of JPAA staff and students. A huge well done to Savannah and Mia and also Holly, Lila, Areena, Lizzie and Emma who won our first ever Choreography Competition and performed their pieces in the showcase.

In March we had our first Whole School Musical in two years, Shrek. All of our JPAA members took part and were huge ambassadors for the department as they took on many lead roles, acted as advanced dancers and were role models to other cast members during the rehearsal process where they showed just how professionals would act during a production process. For many of our academy members, this was their first large scale production, if not their first performance at SHS and we were overwhelmed by the high performance standard of our JPAA students.



This year our Year 8-10 JPAA students have chosen to work on their Arts Award in Bronze and Silver. This week they took part in their moderation exam and we celebrated their participation and engagement in the arts.

Next year we already have an exciting year planned for our JPAA students including more trips, professional workshops, competitions and productions and we look forward to working with our students in honing and developing their skills as performers as well as welcoming our new JPAA Year 7 students to join the team.

Sport

The achievements in extra-curricular sport this term have been extraordinary, even by Shenfield standards!



The U12 girls and U16 girls football teams were both crowned National Cup Champions at the start of this term, while our U12 boys finished as Runners-Up. The U12 girls won 7-1 at West Bromwich Albion FC with Evie Whymark and Maisie Brickell both scoring hattricks.



The U16 girls claimed the second title with a 4-2 win at Stoke City FC with goals from Ellie Moore, Mia Sanders, Mia Robins and Layla Kenly.

The U13 girls, U14 girls, U12 boys and U18 boys were all Essex Cup football champions whilst the U13 boys and U16 girls finished as Runners-Up.

As we moved into the cricket season we saw more success than in a very long time! Four Shenfield teams reached Essex Cup finals which is remarkable given cricket is normally so dominated by private schools. Our U13 and U15 boys lost their finals with the U17 girls and U14 girls winning their Essex finals. The U15 girls will play their final in September, they also got to the last 32 of their National cup beating three private schools before defeat away against an impressive Framlingham School side.

The U17 boys beat three strong private schools in reaching the National Cup plate 1/4 final. We played at the hugely impressive Stowe School but lost out to an

excellent team on the day. Meanwhile our 1st XI played against the MCC in our annual fixture in which Kyan Lehal took five wickets and earned himself an invite Lords cricket ground.

The SHS Athletics season was also a successful one with our Year 7 and 9 boys winning the District title. Our U13 and U15 girls teams also made the Regional A finals of the ESAA Track and Field Cup while the U13 boys won the Regional B finals. We also had several new school records and these will all be displayed on the school website in the coming days.

Our U14 mixed rounders team comprehensively beat St Martins to win the District title before beating Saffron Walden in the final of the Essex round. This qualified the team for the National Finals at Leicester University. The Shenfield team won every game comfortably up to the final where they again met Saffron Walden. This game was a tense affair but our players held their nerve to win the National title on the last ball, Shenfield's 3rd National title of a hugely successful year.

Thanks to students, parents and teachers for their huge efforts to allow such success this year. Skiing

Through the winter of 2021 and spring of 2022, Dylan continued to train with the GB U15 Baseball squad and was selected as part of the Extended Roster.

In August of 2021, the Redbacks played in an end of season tournament, where Dylan hit two Grand Slam homeruns. From that performance he was asked if he wanted to join the London Archers Baseball Club.

The Archers are a traveling baseball club, made up of players from across the country. The team travels to international tournaments throughout Europe. Since joining the team, Dylan has traveled to Spain and Germany to play in tournaments, with future travel to Italy and the Czech Republic planned.



Along with playing for the Redback, Archers and GB, Dylan also plays in the London Youth Baseball League. The league is made up of young people from across the country, in various age groups. Dylan participates in both the Intermediate group (10-13) as well as the Juniors group (13 - 15). They play their games at Farnham Park National Baseball Fields in Slough and this keeps him busy on Saturdays and Sundays during the season.

This summer, Dylan will be participating in a Major League Baseball Cadet camp taking place in July. The camp will be led by top MLB Europe coaches as well as GB coaches.

Boxing

Year 10 student and boxer Jake Hornsby won the gold medal at the long running Monkstown International Box Cup in late June. He went over to Dublin and boxed in a 'winner-stays-on' format, fighting some of the best boxers in Europe in his age group. In a superb performance he managed to win every fight with unanimous judges' decisions and came away with the gold.
