
Year 9 Geography Interhouse Competition Winners

Over the half term holiday in October, our year 7 pupils had the opportunity to produce a model to illustrate how Ordnance Survey maps show the height and slope of the landscape, and they produced some fantastic designs! It was incredibly difficult to choose our winners for the competition because the standard of entries we received was incredible.

7 winners were selected:

- Matthew and Oliver (7D) produced superb models, including real examples with photos and map evidence to go with their 3D models - carefully layering each change in height.
- Ellie (7P) created a stunning model, cutting around the contour lines and creating a frame below so we could see the shape of the land in 3D.
- Scarlett (7D) showed excellent creativity with her model of Mauna Loa in Hawaii, clearly labelling height and adding detailed vegetation.
- Luke (7H) designed and created a model to represent his own landscape, demonstrating an excellent understanding of the physical landscape.
- Anais (7F) produced an outstanding model, researching the landscape and showing great attention to detail to create a life-like design.
- Harry (7N) used a variety of materials to create a fantastic model to show how the shape of a hill can be represented on maps.




### **Sixth Form News**




This season is already shaping up to be exciting:

Following her performance in Fiji, Miss Thornhill was invited to join Monaco's team for the prestigious Dubai tournament last week. Each team is permitted a few guest players, and she was thrilled to be chosen as their 'all-star' player. After a short training period, they competed across three days, winning all but one match and advancing to the final against Hong Kong. In the final, Miss Thornhill scored two tries, bringing her tournament total to 11 tries and earning the title of Top Try Scorer - a truly amazing achievement!

### Art

This term we have begun our new GCSE 3D Design and our students have been developing their skills in ceramics and wire construction, learning new techniques and researching artists around the theme of Natural Forms.

Our year 10 Fine Art students also explore naturals forms, further developing the work they began through our trip to RHS Hyde Hall earlier in the term. This small sample shows their experimentation with different media and the influence of the artists they are researching.

Year 9 have been using watercolour this half term to create abstract pictures of shells, influenced by the artist Amiria Gale. They begin this project by drawing shells from life in pencil and develop their work through a process of abstracting the image to embrace colour and pattern.

Here are some of my highlights from the performance at Palace Theatre, Southend.

What a bold and cheeky production of Twelfth Night this was! The play started with a beautiful movement sequence to tell the story of the storm. This was very effective ensemble movement, including impressive lifts, and you worked very maturely to rehearse all of this on the stage (which happens to have the steepest rake in the country!)

The entire production was full of comedy. Everyone's physical performances were very impressive - you made the audience laugh out loud through strong, well-timed physicality, very expressive facial expressions and good ensemble reactions at key moments, most notably when the twins reunited. It was a great climax to end all of the drama and mistaken identities!

I thoroughly enjoyed all of the bold choices you had made to modernise the story. I particularly loved your decision to replace Malvolio's yellow stocking with a luminous tracksuit – it looked fantastic and made that scene even more dynamic and hilarious. You also incorporated some brilliant slapstick sequences, which were cheeky and engaging and showed off your breadth of skills as a company.

The team work from the group was exceptional. I was very impressed by how you all pulled together to support two students who had joined the project late on in rehearsals. I was also thrilled by how you sped up the transitions from technical rehearsal to dress, in order to 'keep the stage alive'. Your tenacity and professionalism did not go unnoticed.

The girls teams have several more group games to play in January but have started well. Best of luck to all the teams for their big games in the New Year.




