



Good evening, everyone.

It's really lovely to be back here and to have the chance to share my journey with you. I could say the clichéd: 'Not too long ago, I was sitting exactly where you are now' but I won't. It's true but I trust that you all can guess than from my being invited back.

I'm a first-year law student at the University of Bristol, and it's everything I hoped university would be. But it's also been the result of years of learning, resilience, and hard work. The reason I've been invited here today is to share how I got myself where I am and what it was like in the hope that something in my story might resonate with you or help you shape your own aspirations into something that's right for each and every one of you.

Looking back at my time in school, I can honestly say that those were some of the most important years in shaping who I am. After I completed GCSEs, I studied History, English, and Physics at Alevel, which may sound like a bit of an unusual combination. And yes — it was challenging at times. But that's exactly what I appreciated most about those subjects. A large part of how I got here is that I actually wanted to learn and tried to take every opportunity to do so. History taught me how to analyse complex ideas and see connections across time. English deepened my love for expression, language, and creativity. And Physics — though very different — taught me how approach problems logically and to methodically, even when they felt impossible at first (and, trust me, they almost always felt impossible, it's physics).

Overall though, I don't think it's about what exactly you are learning but the way in which you take advantage of the opportunities given to you. It's about finding something you love and absorbing as much information and knowledge as you can. That is what gets you far; the teachers at this school recognised my determination and tried so hard to help me achieve the goals that I strived towards. That was what my time at Shenfield was like. Hard work supplemented by connections with peers and teachers. School was more than just lessons and grades — it was where I learned resilience, balance, and ambition. It was where I first really understood the value of hard work.

When I used to think about my aspirations and deciding the right path for me, I suppose I expected one big reason, filled with multiple layers and experiences that made who I am. I thought I'd discover what I wanted to do as a culmination of all of that. In reality, it wasn't like that at all. I didn't know what I was interested in or what I wanted to be for a long time. I knew that performing wasn't a stable profession so I looked for something that was. So, no, it wasn't this epic reason filled with grandeur and aspirational success like an ancient Greek hero's origin story, it was simple and grounded in what I knew I wanted personally. I guess it was luck that I ended up genuinely loving the subject I chose.

So when we fast forward to now, and I'm studying Law. It's intense — there's a lot of blood, sweat and tears that push me forward. But every challenge also feels purposeful. I continue to love law because I want to make a difference and the possibilities in this field are inspiring.

I'm still figuring out the exact path I want to take — whether it's becoming a solicitor or a barrister . And that's okay. Aspirations don't have to be set in stone from day one. They change and fluctuate and forgiving myself for changing my mind has been a large part of my journey. What matters most is having that drive to keep moving forward. I know that as long as I keep working hard, staying open to opportunities, and believing in myself, I will get where I want to be — even if the route is unexpected.

If I can leave you with one message today, it's this:

Hard work really does lead to great things.

It doesn't mean never failing or never having doubts — I've certainly had both. But it means showing up every day, putting in the effort even when it's difficult, and trusting that those small steps add up. Your time at school, just like mine was, is full of opportunity. Every subject you take, every extracurricular you join, every conversation you have — all of it helps shape your future.

So aim high. Stay curious. Be resilient. And above all, believe that with determination and effort, you can achieve far more than you might even imagine right now.



We wish them all the best in their exams and the wider world beyond.





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
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History Year 7 Interhouse Castle Competition

Combat Cadet Competition 2025

Over the weekend of 4th - 6th April, Shenfield High School CCF and 2 staff officers travelled to Prince William of Gloucester Barracks, Grantham, for the annual Combat Cadet competition run by 7 Brigade Cadet Training Team (CTT).



The competition section was led by RSM Pearce and SSgt Riches. The team arrived in high spirits ready for the competition. After lots of admin including issue of rations, ammunition and radios, the cadet Section Commander RSM Pearce and Captain Brooks headed off into a briefing to receive instructions for what lay ahead. The rest of the section and Major Maynard continued making ready and preparing/checking kit for the rigours of the next couple of days.

It was an early start (05:30am) Saturday morning as every team had to deploy to Beckingham Training Area and be ready to start the competition at 08:30am sharp. Points were lost for being late.

The team rotated through 3 phases over the entire weekend with 8 stands to complete in the next 36 hours, competing against 18 other cadet units from across the southeast region. The stands included a section attack, observation, skill at arms, navigation, house clearance, a casualty evacuation and a patrol lane. All the stands tested their communication, teamwork, leadership and military knowledge. The team worked incredibly hard all weekend, winning one of the sections outright and coming away with silver medals at the final parade on Sunday, an improvement on our participation in previous competitions where we achieved bronze status. This is an amazing achievement when considering some cadet units train intensively for years specifically for this competition. It was a great competition and everyone thoroughly enjoyed it.



Live Firing Range Day

On Saturday 10th May, 26 Year 10-13 cadets, accompanied by CCF staff, embarked on a journey from the school to the MOD Fingeringhoe ranges between Colchester and Mersea Island for Live Firing and Marksmanship Training.



Upon reaching the ranges, the cadets engaged in several refresher shoots, where they took turns firing under the guidance of 7 Brigade Cadet Training Team (CTT) staff. Each section of the shoot involved a change in firing position, including prone supported, prone unsupported and kneeling, all requiring very different shooting disciplines and techniques, contributing to the overall assessment and final score. Notably, among the participants, Cadet Vemula achieved the best score for Year 10 cadets.

Why Join SHS Cadets ?

This is a question we are frequently asked by both students and parents, of both existing students and those parents planning for their younger children when choosing schools post primary, until recently we had just given a simple 'why not' followed by a brief overview and personal analysis of the short and long-term benefits that joining Shenfield High School cadets can offer.

We are delighted to be able to share the news that the University of Nottingham were commissioned by the government in 2016 to undertake an extensive and protracted research into the benefits that school-based CCF membership offers to young adults in academic Years 9-13 in the UK. The research and report were published in March 2025.

The overriding compelling message and outcome was that participation in cadets has a hugely positive impact on numerous aspects of school and personal life, including but not limited to selfbelief. motivation. attendance. behaviour. resilience, attitude to learning and a clear indication that cadets become more successful as they transition into further education, careers and adulthood. This is supported by the new report which unequivocally demonstrates that being a cadet gives pupils an 'edge' in applications for college, university, apprenticeships and employment.

We are incredibly proud of the fact that we are one of only nine percent of state schools nationally that offer the opportunity to participate in a CCF within the school they attend, and the only local state school that has the added benefit of a CCF firmly embedded into the ethos of everyday school life at Shenfield High School. We have included the link to the report for convenience and would urge you to take the time to read some if not all the research and findings.

Lower School Play



We have also been given the opportunity to extend the exhibition of our student's work until the end of July so there will be lots of opportunity to view their amazing work.






